## PREMIUM RATIONALE

The government gives extra funding to improve provision of physical education (PE) and sport in primary schools. This funding - provided jointly by the Departments for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport - is ring-fenced and therefore can only be spent on provision of PE and sport in schools. It has been increased this year.

Schools must spend the funding to improve the quality of the PE and sport activities they offer their pupils, but they are free to choose the best way of using the money.

## STRATEGY STATEMENT

Investment of the Sports Premium grant is planned to ensure the sustainability of PE and sports provision across our school. By using the funding to develop CPD (continuous professional development) and to enhance the resources and facilities used by our pupils, we aim to see the benefits of funding in future years, not just the academic year in which it is awarded. To this aim we intend to see a positive impact on the reduction of barriers to participation in sport and physical activity experienced by our pupils. Therefore, our plan will focus on:

- The health and wellbeing of the children
- · Quality first teaching
- Hire specialist PE teachers.
- Hire qualified sports coaches to work with teachers.
- Provide existing staff with teaching resources to help them teach PE and sport.
- Support and involve the least active children by running or extending school sports clubs.
- Run sport competitions or increase pupils' participation in the School Games.
- Run sports activities with other schools.
